

This year, the first anniversary of the Supreme Court decision that overturned *Roe v. Wade* also falls on Shabbat. So in addition to the ritual to light a *yartzheit* candle, we also have a handy sheet to commemorate the loss of *Roe* over Shabbat:

HADLAKOT NEROT / Blessing before lighting the candles
